DEFINITION OF NATURE USED IN PAGE COMPETITIONS

This Nature Definition is now used by all Exhibitions having FIAP and/or PSA patronage. The PAGB have three competitions which are specifically nature – the Annual Inter-Federation Nature PDI Competition, the GB Nature Cup (PDI) and the GB Nature Trophy (prints). Other competitions, such as the Inter-Club Championships, and the Awards for Photographic Merit, accept a limited number of nature pictures but do not apply a Nature Definition.

This definition has been subject to varied interpretation and some examples were reported in June 2015 in **e-news 141** - http://www.pagbnews.co.uk/sites/default/files/newsletters/en141_220615_WarwickSpecial.pdf

Recently we received this (edited) question. "We have just received our club's DVD of the GB Cup entries, for which we are very grateful. In watching parts 1 & 2 Nature we noticed the inclusion of 'Human Intervention' included in a number of images i.e. Traffic Lights, Fence Posts, Barbed Wire, Gates and even two Jackdaws with peanuts. We thought that the new Nature Definition stated that No Human Intervention should be included in nature photographs?" Since there is probably widespread confusion on this issue we thought it worth publishing here. Please note that our reply indicates policy for PAGB competitions and other organisations may not agree.



The definition was developed in discussion between FIAP and the PSA and, despite problems with the English translation, was agreed by the RPS, and later, adopted by the PAGB.

Nature photography is restricted to the use of the photographic process to depict all branches of natural history, except anthropology and archeology, in such a fashion that a well-informed person will be able to identify the subject material and certify its honest presentation.

The story telling value of a photograph must be weighed more than the pictorial quality while maintaining high technical quality. Human elements shall not be present, except where those human elements are integral parts of the nature story such as nature subjects, like barn owls or storks, **adapted to an environment modified by humans**, or where those human elements are in situations depicting natural forces, like hurricanes or tidal waves.

Scientific bands, scientific tags or radio collars on wild animals are permissible. Photographs of human created hybrid plants, cultivated plants, feral animals, domestic animals, or mounted specimens are ineligible, as is any form of manipulation that alters the truth of the photographic statement.

No techniques that add, relocate, replace, or remove pictorial elements except by cropping are permitted. Techniques that enhance the presentation of the photograph without changing the nature story or the pictorial content, or without altering the content of the original scene, are permitted including HDR, focus stacking and dodging/burning. Techniques that remove elements added by the camera, such as dust spots, digital noise, and film scratches, are allowed. Stitched images are not permitted. All allowed adjustments must appear natural. Color images can be converted to greyscale monochrome. Infrared images, either direct captures or derivations, are not allowed.

Whilst the widely agreed Nature Definition has represented welcome progress there is still considerable scope for interpretation. For the matter raised the crucial words are "... adapted to an environment modified by humans...". (Shown in **bold** in the box above.)

If you accept, as our GB Cup judges and the GB Cup Chairman did, that a bird perching on a fence or a gate, or even traffic light is simply *adapting to its environment* then there is obviously no breach of the rules.

If there had been a person feeding peanuts to the Jackdaws we would have disallowed it but, without such evidence, we cannot know where the nuts were scavenged from. They may have taken them from a man-made feeder but it can still be argued that, so long as we cannot see the feeder, these birds have *adapted to their environment* and have identified a food source. How would this be any different from an Osprey or a Kingfisher carrying a fish taken from a baited pool? Would it be sensible to disallow a picture of a bird freely perched on a man-made object, not provided for that purpose, but yet allow pictures taken in locations deliberately modified by photographers to encourage birds and animals to "perform" for our cameras? A fence is not acceptable but a dead branch propped up near a nest is?

In essence, we expect our judge's and organisers to employ common-sense. Indeed, if we were to interpret literally as was described in e-news 141, is there a square inch of the UK and much of the world that does not demonstrate "the influence of Man".

Celtic Challenge 2016





Stage 1, Using The Scalpel

This required the use of a steady hand and some patience. Chris is, luckily, an

able person when it comes to also have to hold the blade using his hands. My mother, on the other hand, is likely to slice her hands when left anywhere near an open blade. Let's just say the scalpel is not for everyone.

Cutting through mountboard, which is a tough mixture of wood pulp fibres firmly pressed together, is hard work. Your forearm and upper arm need to be fairly resilient to pressure and continued exertion. Repetitive strain injury here we come!

Now, to the technique. The method is simple; one must run the scalpel blade along the straight edge of a steel rule whilst holding the mount down firmly using your other hand. Following a steel rule edge isn't quite so easy when you

edge at a 45° angle to the rule. Remember to stop at exactly the right place, avoiding any overcuts on your cornersl

Stage 2, Handheld Cutters

Moving up in the world meant. changing the scalpel to an actual cutter, a contraption that held the blade at a fixed angle AND had a stop marker on it!

One would butt the cutter up against the edge of the steel rule, insert the blade at the start, using the marker as a guide, and push it along the rail until you reached the stop line, again using the marker as a guide.

LONGRIDGE

- Support your rail; use a base to keep it secure.
- Secure the mount; use a mount stop.
- Avoid overcut corners: use cutter stops.
- Use your body, not your wrist, when cut-
- Mount cutting SHOULD BE EASY!

Stage 3, The Basic Kit

PHEW! Finally we have got to the stage where the cutter is supported in two ways; it is attached to the rail, and therefore cuts parallel, and the rail has a base which keeps it still.

This cutting arrangement becomes one unit and helps to reduce the pressure on our strained arms. There are still a few issues with accuracy though :(

Stage 4, The LONGRIDGE

In 2000, the Longridge Mount Cutting System was born. At your finger tips, you could own something which takes minutes and minimal effort.

Simply mark up the mount using a Longridge Border Marker, slide the mount under the rail and up to the mountboard stop, put the cutter on the rail, adjust the cutter stops, insert the blade and push until you feel it stop. The aperture just drops out, bliss!

It is very easy at work and play to fall back on the use of initials forgetting that not everyone knows what they mean. e-news is as guilty as anyone so we thought it might be worth listing some of the more common photographic ones.

PAGB is, of course, the Photographic Alliance of Great Britain, founded in 1930, it is the co-ordinating body for its 15 autonomous, regional, Photographic Federations and Unions. The PAGB organises a number of National Events and offers its Awards for Photographic Merit (APM) to Club members. CPAGB = Credit, DPAGB = Distinction and MPAGB = Master and **APAGB** and **HonPAGB** for service to the PAGB and its affiliated Clubs. http://www.thepagb.org.uk/

FIAP is the Fédération Internationale de l'Art Photographique. More than 85 national associations are members, comprising nearly one million individual photographers. FIAP gives its Patronage to many International Exhibitions and Salons and awards its own distinctions AFIAP, EFIAP and MFIAP. They also organise Biennial competitions in several genres. Both Scotland and Wales were members of FIAP before the PAGB joined. Scotland has maintained its membership constantly and the WPF rejoined a few years ago so both access FIAP services and competitions via their own FIAP Officer. (North Wales is not separately affiliated to FIAP). https://www.fiap.net/

PSA, the Photographic Society of America, has many non-USA members and, like FIAP, offers its patronage to International Exhibitions as well as awarding its own Star Rating and distinctions such as APSA, EPSA and GMPSA. https://www.psa-photo.org/index.php?home

RPS, the Royal Photographic Society, is the oldest of these organisations, dating from 1853, and is comprised of around 11,000 fee paying individual members, amateur and professional, mostly in the UK. It has a substantial permanent staff based in its HQ in Bath and, with the help of many volunteers, arranges a full programme of exhibitions and education. It offers distinctions, to its members only, of LRPS = Licentiate, ARPS = Associate and FRPS = Fellowship as well as Honorary distinctions for service to the Society. http://www.rps.org/

BPE is the British Photographic Exhibitions, an affiliation of 20 UK National Exhibitions and offers its own BPE Crown Awards, as well as ABPE and FBPE, for participation in them.
