
THE FIRST ONLINE AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT IN AUDIO VISUAL ADJUDICATION

There is no charge for observers to view the adjudication, so please feel free to pass on the link to other members of your clubs and groups.

There are Six applicants for CPAGB?AV, Six applicants for DPAGB/AV and 4 for MPAGB/AV with a total of more than 30 entertaining sequences.

The Assessors are Robert Albright (Chairman of the Adjudicators), Gordon Jenkins, Howard Bagshaw, Richard Speirs and Martin Fry. After the sequences in each application have been played, the Awards Chairman, Rod Wheelans, will request a Pass/Fail/Undecided vote from the adjudicators. This will be in a private message and will not be on public view. He will then invite comments from selected assessors, after which the panel will vote privately again. At the end of each session, the assessors will retire to a private break-out room for a final discussion, which will confirm the result of each application, which will be announced at the end of the day.

You can enter as an Individual or you can organise an entry on behalf of your Club. You should be a bona fide member of a Club affiliated to the PAGB and may only enter once per competition and for one Club each year.

If your Club is not currently operating, or you are unable to join it because of the current restrictions, let us know and we will permit your entry.

The Covid Crisis has ensured that there cannot be a physical exhibition or an opening party in 2020. We had previously, and very sadly, announced the cancellation of the MASTERS ?F PRINTS ... BUT N?W IT IS BACK!

No physical exhibition but the same prestige, the same high standard, the same distinctive badge and another fabulous catalogue for EVERY entrant.

Since we will not be mounting or framing the accepted prints there will be less constraint on size and format provided that you submit on A3 inkjet or 12"x16" darkroom paper.

Even if we are unable to mount an exhibition for you to visit, we will feature all of the accepted pictures in e-news and in a PDI show which will be available through our Recorded Lecture Service. Successful entrants will also be invited to join our Masters Hall of Fame, and to have more of their work featured here.

And of course, we will retain the accepted prints in the hope that it will be possible to exhibit them at a later time.

I have read many articles by sports men and women who have all said that they knew when it was time to retire. In certain cases, this is just as relevant in anything we do.



We are Jon and Sue Baker, perhaps better known as "Four Feet From Telford." I have been judging at Camera Clubs for just over 30 years now and can still remember my first faltering steps. I became a Fellow of The Royal Photographic Society in October 1988 and almost immediately, my phone was ringing with Clubs asking me to come and judge their competitions. "After all", they said, "you are an FRPS so you must know what you are talking about" If only! So started my career in Club Judging and by late 2018, I had judged Club, Federation, National and International Competitions.

The end came swiftly. In 2018, I had Radical Prostate Cancer surgery. Many things pass through your mind, but I stayed positive, wanting to carry on with my hobby. I judged a competition ~ Nature and Open ~ at a Camera Club and halfway through judging the Nature images, a photographer stood up and said that this was not being judged as a Nature Competition and that I did not know what I was talking about. Pins could be heard dropping and no-one said anything to this person. A Mexican Stand Off ensued, but I can look after myself, so politely asked them to sit down. However, the damage was done. I don't know if it was too soon after my operation, but I just remember standing there thinking what on earth am I doing here and why am I bothering. Thirty years of trying to be objective and pass on as much information as I could was destroyed in a couple of minutes. have not judged Club Competitions since.

Lecturing on the other hand, has been the joy of my life. I produced my first Mono talk in 1991 and have been very fortunate over the years to have been sponsored by The On-Line Paper Company. The owner, Chris Burslem, was always very positive about my work and this gave me great confidence. In the mid 90's Sue had become more confident in her photography and joined me on stage. Thus "Four Feet From Telford" was born.

We have so much enjoyed our travels around The UK, visiting nearly every Federation and doing tours in The Republic of Ireland, Scotland, Cumbria, The North East, Wales, South East and South West England. As proud Midlanders, it has been an honour to represent The MCPF, even as far as being interviewed on Austrian TV. I would have been quite happy to have carried on giving talks until my last breath, but as you get older life does become a series of compromises. During the last 10 years, I have had the privilege of putting together Audio Visual Presentations of The Wrekin Salon and The Midland Salon. Photography and Rock Music, it doesn't get any better!

We have had wonderful times on the road and met some really inspiring people. There is nothing quite like a winters night, in a warm, darkened room talking to like-minded people about something we all enjoy doing.

A DNA gift from my father was Retinitis Pigmentosa, a degenerative eye condition. For a number of years now I have had to have DVLA eye tests and recently it has become obvious that I am struggling to see to drive at night. I cannot put anyone's life at risk just to continue lecturing, so we have decided to call it a day.

We shall miss it all dreadfully. We have had wonderful times on the road and met some really inspiring people. There is nothing quite like a winters night, in a warm, darkened room talking to like-minded people about something we all enjoy doing. Doing a Zoom presentation is nothing like this, so now is the time for Sue and I to take a new road. We cannot possibly get round to see all the friends we have made, so please know that we remember you all. You never know, we may just turn up to one of your meetings. The cameras are still being used and we have our website at <u>www.jonandsuebaker.co.uk/</u>. Please feel free to leave us a message there.

Take care, take good pictures and enjoy your hobby. All I have ever wanted to do was put something back into photography and hopefully, I have succeeded. The last 30 years have been an absolute blast and we would not have missed it for anything.


And so we began. Yes, we had a few teething problems some evenings and still do. But, with a sense of humour and good grace we are able to work together to overcome such irritations.

Of course, for those summer meetings we had no booked speakers nor an agenda, so we had to rely on the ingenuity and commitment We even held our annual National Open Exhibition in November 2020. Given the circumstances, this was an enormous undertaking and the entire event had to be transferred to a virtual platform. The photographic community again stepped forward.

We were able to secure international judges and we attracted a bumper crop of entries.

of our members. I can say with great pride that everyone stepped forward enthusiastically and played their part.

During those summer months, members shared their many and varied photographic enthusiasms - and what a show it was! We were showered with such photographic genres as travelogues, documentary, nature, street, still life, and in one instance an even stiller life – a photographic trip to Highgate Cemetery!



After the summer months, with the pandemic in full flow, we began our planned 20/21 season in September entirely, over Zoom. Because we were meeting "virtually", we were able to book many speakers and judges from further afield than normal. We had a sparkling array for our members and we also continued with our competitions. All the speakers and judges were exemplary in their ability to adjust to the new environment. And, far from shrinking as we had gloomily anticipated at first, our weekly attendance increased. Indeed, we have had

new enquiries to join. Members were finding that the regular virtual contact was a bonus, both socially and creatively. So, thinking about how members had

enjoyed the summer months where we had informal online meetings, we decided to hold another weekly club "virtual" meeting for people to present their own work, to share their photographic enthusiasms or just to meet up and natter about things photographic. This has become a beloved event.

In conclusion, I would say, for us at Frome Wessex Camera Club, it's an ill wind that blows no-one any good. As a result of the pandemic and though various lockdowns and problems, we found that our great shared activity of photography has bonded us tighter as a club and community resource and has proved a vehicle via which we can help each other get through this extraordinary and daunting pandemic.

FIAP BIENNIAL ENTRY

On behalf of the selection committee, thank you to the Clubs and Individuals who took part in the selection process for the PAGB entry into the FIAP 2021 Colour Biennial. We have now made the final selection of 30 images to represent the PAGB in the competition. (Scotland and South Wales are separate members of FIAP and make a separate entry.)

We had to select two themed panels (20 Digital Images and 10 Prints) from the images submitted and supplemented by additional work taken from FIAP portfolios. Our two themes are 'Creative Portraits' for our digital entry, and 'Minimalistic Landscapes' for our Print entry.

The final scores for our submission will be based both on the individual images and the coherence of the panels so, unfortunately, it sometimes means that we had to leave out some excellent images which didn't fit the panels.

This competition is to be judged in France on 27th March 2021. Watch for more information then, with the entry in full, together with some of the great images that didn't make the cut.





CYANOTYPE

The English scientist and astronomer Sir John Herschel discovered the Cyanotype procedure in 1842. The process was developed by Herschel, but he considered it as mainly a means of reproducing notes and diagrams, as in blueprints. Anna Atkins created a series of cyanotype limited-edition books that documented ferns and other plant life from her extensive seaweed collection, placing specimens directly onto coated paper and allowing the action of light to create a silhouette effect. By using this photogram process, Anna Atkins is sometimes considered first female photographer. the Cyanotype photography was popular in Victorian England but became less popular as photography improved. Another proponent of the craft was Washington Teasdale from Leeds. Numerous contemporary artists employ the cyanotype process in their art such as Christian Marclay, Marco Breuer, Kate Cordsen and John Dugdale.


Encouraged by my success, I attended a further WCPF Advisory Day in 2019 and went on to enter 15 images for the DPAGB Award, due to be


I enjoy giving photographic presentations, teaching some processing skills and sharing my passion for photography.



JOHN LONG DPAGB ARPS 26/12/1931 - 24/01/2021

In the current situation with the Pandemic, I fear we may be getting a little de-sensitised to the constant news reports of people dying from this virus. Although not Covid19 related - it was still so sad to hear that a stalwart of our photographic world had sadly "hung up his camera". There have been quite a few tributes to John's passing on Facebook and other areas of social media, so I don't think there will be many who haven't learned of John's unexpected passing.

I'm not going to dwell on how and where John died. Instead, I'd like to make this my own personal tribute to one of the nicest people I have ever had the privilege to meet in the photographic world - and there have been so, so very many.

I have spent a long time trying to make audio visuals, at first on a Windows computer, then I absconded to Apple! I retained my interest in AV, even though the software has only recently been made available for Mac users. In the meantime, I maintained my membership to Western Audio Visual Enthusiasts (WAVES) over the years, waiting for "Pics to Exe" software to be written for the Mac platform. This was where I first got to know John, some 15 years ago when we were both "new kids on the block"!



As an active member of Probus, John frequently enjoyed trips away with the group, and this became a source for many of his AV's, shown at WAVES meetings in Trowbridge every three months. Former WAVES Secretary, Jenny Byram and her husband Tony, would kindly bring John from Bristol with them - thus ensuring he didn't miss any of these meetings!

I realised, of course, that John was a very active and high-profile figure in the photographic world, but I have, nonetheless, been amazed at just how active and how high his profile was!

Some of the clubs he belonged to were -

WAVES - of course! A member for some 15 - 16 years, and a regular contributor to their "Members' Sequences."

Some people leave fortunes. Then there are those who leave warm memories. The Kingswood Photographic Society which he joined in the early 50's becoming their Secretary in1957 become their Secretary, a role he held for the next 43 years! He then became their President, and ultimately was made an Honorary member of the club. He created and maintained their website and was responsible for their Publicity which he was still actively doing until very recently.

memories. The Royal Photographic Society. He had been a member of their Licentiate Panel and then he read the Statements of Intent for those applying for their Associateships. He also edited the Digital Imaging Group's DIGIT magazine for a time.

The Western Counties Photographic Federation, of which he was President from 1990 - 1993, having previously edited the Directory. John gained his DPAGB and was also awarded the J.S. Lancaster Medal with the appellation HonPAGB – only given to a very few highly respected people for their service

to the PAGB and its Federations and Clubs.

The UPP, (The United Photographic Postfolios) and the Crown Monochrome Group.

Until very recently, John was still a popular judge and speaker, but he was not only an active member and participant on the photography scene - he was also a keen winemaker!

Please forgive me if I've omitted something. In all the years I've known John, I wasn't privy to half of this! John never "blew his own trumpet", so these achievements were not broadcast!

He was a private, very gentle man, the epitome of that word and he was always ready to help anyone with their photography, or in any way he could.



A few years ago, I had to write an obituary for Margaret Hodge. She had also been A President of the WCPF, and John proved to be invaluable, helping to me to write this, and providing photographs, one of which is 'Three Paddling Presidents'!

Some people leave fortunes. Then there are those who simply leave warm memories. John Long was one of these. It will be a long time, if ever, before anyone fills the big gap left in our community!


So "thank you John" for your boundless help, kindness and some wonderful memories! Sleep peacefully.

Our PAGB Scheme Covers:

Public Liability

This covers accidental damage or injury to third parties caused by negligence of your club. Limit of indemnity is £5m as standard, with higher limits available on request.

Clubs 'All Risks'

This covers equipment owned by or loaned to the club, whilst in UK, also in Europe or worldwide for up to 45 days in any one year.

Management Liability

This covers Clubs Officers against any claim made against them during the policy period for any Wrongful Act in their capacity as an Officer of the Club or Society.
