DEFINITION OF A PAGE CLUB

The Photographic Alliance of Great Britain in Section 9 of their Constitution defines a Club as:

A camera club, photographic society, photographic club or photographic group with a published constitution and programme of events, united by a common interest in photography, meeting in person for mutual co-operation, education, entertainment or competition solely from one or more physical locations within the Geographical Limits of the PAGB.

The Geographical Limits of the PAGB include The United Kingdom, the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands and only Clubs falling within this definition are qualified to enter PAGB Competitions. Clubs are expected to meet regularly, meaning at least twelve times each year, usually during a prescribed season, and in person, meaning at an actual physical location with members present - not an online meeting or "outing"...

Exceptions

Historically the PAGB has affiliated a number of National and Specialist Clubs. The Federations where they are affiliated to the Alliance may ask to have such Clubs accepted into PAGB Competitions, but each must be specifically agreed by the PAGB Executive Committee.

Gibraltar PS, a member of the SCPF, has been recognised by the PAGB as an affiliated Club which is eligible to enter PAGB Competitions.

"I've been a keen photographer for many years, specialising in landscape over the last ten years. This interest came from the desire to make record of my outdoors adventures, mainly in my native Scotland. Rather than spend money on endless photo kit upgrades, I prefer to spend it on finding beauty in special places with my camera.





In 2022 I had a trip of a lifetime to explore the abandoned communities of the great plains of Montana and North Dakota in deep winter. It was an incredible experience and knew that I had to make something special to commemorate it. I have used other companies in the past and become increasingly unhappy with the quality. Images lacked contrast, were often too dark and the colours seemed flat. I did some research online and it became clear that CEWE are the highest rated photobook printers. I was overjoyed to hear that my book had attracted attention and had won the January 2024 'book of the month' award! It is always so heartening to have your work recognised."

I started out in camera clubs, then got myself a photography degree. Now I'm back at a camera club where I enjoy the social aspects, but I also want to share my photography.

A little context. The photography I did during my degree is extremely different to club photography. It's all about context and meaning. A lot of questions get asked, such as why you took the picture and who is it for. It requires time to understand it, looking at the image, reading the artist statement and then looking at it some more so you can see if it resonates with you as a viewer, and whether you can see what the artist was trying to achieve. Club photography is almost the complete opposite. Your picture, especially in competitions, is considered extremely quickly and the viewer doesn't really have time to think about the image before they move on to the next one. It's about the immediate visual impact. In competition, it's also about conforming.. Is it sharp? Is everything in focus? Does it tell a story in that brief few seconds the judge looks at it?

I feel that I have found a balance between these styles of photography and I'm trying to bring some of what I learned during my degree, and my explorations since then, into my club.

I work with film as well as digital photography. I experiment with alternative photographic processes and, as well as making images that fit the formula for competitions, I like to throw a curve ball or three into the mix.

I still have a traditional darkroom and I make prints there and enter them into competition. I make hybrids, say an inkjet print of one of my scanned negatives and I enter my alternative process prints as well. My work is generally well received by the members of clubs I have been at. People are interested in knowing how a cyanotype print is made, and I give demonstrations.



These birds were shot digitally over a couple of weeks. I converted the pictures to mono, inverted them in photoshop, and used an inkjet printer to print them on to transparency film. I then coated my paper with cyanotype solution and made this set of prints.

<< Cover Image. This is a wet cyanotype of Cosmos. It's made by coating the paper with a light sensitive cyanotype solution, placing the flowers on it and then adding extra liquids. In this one I used soap suds. I also sprinkled turmeric as well. I sandwiched it between a board and a piece of glass and placed it in the sun for a couple of hours. The heat from the sun, the liquids and the plant material all combine to create the image. I brought inside, rinsed and left it to dry. This one was photographed whilst still wet, as I loved the colours. As it dries, it darkens, and the pale blues turn to Prussian blue. I entered this into a quarterly competition and was extremely shocked that it scored 20 points!</p>

Image 8. I also like to tone my cyanotype prints. This was made the same way as the birds but was bleached in soda crystals and then placed in a tray of very strong, cheap coffee. The tannins in the coffee react with the iron that's left in the paper and give it an almost sketch-like appearance.

Image 4. This is my take on the Pep Ventosa 'In The Round' style. I shot this on a super slow film, ISO 1.6! I entered this into a club competition and titled it 'The Temple at Heaton Park' as that's what the building is. The judge gave it a score of 18 but said he would have preferred to have been left wondering what the image was, and that the title took away some of the mystery of the picture.

Image 3. I really enjoy printing in the darkroom. When I entered this in our quarterly competition, one of the members commented that they knew it was a darkroom print as soon as they saw it. This print scored 16.

The darkroom is becoming much more accessible again. There are community darkrooms where you can pay a small fee and be able to process your films or print your negatives using an enlarger and they all run beginners workshops as well.









Cyanotype is one of the least toxic, and cheapest of the alternative processes, and is really easy to do. It feels so much more rewarding to have a print that you've made yourself, and whilst you may have used a computer for part of it, it is a handmade print. I have run workshops in the past on using the cyanotype process to print your images and these have been very well received. More of my work can be found on my Facebook page and on my website, which has a mix of film, digital and cyanotype.

The box includes 65 unmounted prints with comments by many of the photographers, some suggestions about how your Club might view and chat about them and voting instructions for you to record the "TOP THREE" selected by your members. There will be a prize at the next opening for the author of the Print that receives the most votes.

I took up photography 2022 with a Nikon d800. I got completely hooked onto all the things I could photograph and all I wanted to do was practice and get better. I struggle to focus on one subject due to autism/ADHD, so I try a bit of everything. I find that my photography is a form of therapy for me and I had to learn fast.

I was four months into my photography adventure when I heard about the AWPF distinction and thought, let's do it. I thought it would be a good way to learn but I had no expectations that I would actually achieve the award due to my short time in photography.

I had a year to get my panel in. With the help of my assigned mentor David Condon, I set out on my mission to create a panel of 12 livestock portraits, adult and babies. 5 weeks before the hand in, I joked with David about doing a panel of "furries" and I had to explain that "Furry Fandom" is a subculture, a group of amazing people who enjoy anthropomorphic animal characters, animals with human like characteristics like walking on 2 legs instead of 4, this can range from art to dressing up in a fur-suit. These fur-suits are pretty much like ComiCon cosplay, but these characters are created by the individual fur-suiter. It's a world-wide community.





Better still, forward the link in your own e-mail or suggest that your members subscribe free at www.pagbnews.co.uk.


ELIGIBI:LITY TO ENTER PAGB COMPETITIONS http://thepagb.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/guidance_photographereligility.pdf

We have received a few comments and have observed criticism on social media about the revised eligibility rules published in e-news 354 and now available on our website. Many have expressed similar sentiments to these received from this Club member. (edited).

"Your rules on eligibility physical attendance and living close to clubs are extremely outdated, create effective closed shops and are killing off clubs. In the modern era your failure to recognise online only clubs is making it difficult for some clubs to survive particularly those with older membership who wish to participate but cannot make club evenings due to travel difficulties and inability to drive.

We have members who have moved out of the area but wish to remain in our club. Why should they be forced to join another local club when they have been a member for years and zoom permits them to remain in contact with friends? Clubs should be free to recruit members from wherever they want. Operate in the manner they see best to fit their model for success and existence and should definitely not be forced to join a specific Federation."

Some of you have failed to understand that they applies only to entry to PAGB competitions. Clubs are entirely autonomous. They are "free to recruit members from wherever they want" and can "operate in the manner they see best to fit their model for success and existence". Federations are similarly entirely autonomous and make their own rules regarding their competitions and who they will accept as member Clubs. The PAGB sets its own competition and event rules which is all that this revised Eligibility Criteria apply to. A large majority of Clubs do not enter PAGB competitions and will only be affected by this criteria if the Federation wish to use their work in the PAGB Inter-Federation competition.

PHOTOGRAPHY AND THE POSITIVE IMPACT ON MENTAL HEALTH.

In 2006 I became ill with ME/Fibro and debilitating panic attacks. I lost my career and friends and became housebound. My mental health was declining from frustration and anger about my situation. I discovered something online called The 365 Project which my Mum encouraged me to do, so I dusted off my old camera and set about Day 1. I ran out of things to photograph in the house and with a number of followers I was keen not to disappoint, so I stepped out of the house and life began again. (There were other things I was applying such as pacing and CBT)

Leaving the house was overwhelming but eventually I got accustomed to popping to the local park which became my safe space. I would, and still do, photograph anything that catches my eye. It might be a flower, duck or even a face I might see in tree bark.

A few years later I attended a weekly Mindfulness course, it was then that I realised I had already been practicing a form of mindfulness with my camera. I was using my camera to get closer to nature and still my mind. By concentrating on my surroundings, looking for an image, I was shutting out the rest of the noise and anxiety that plagued me the rest of the time.

My journey in photography progressed and saw me joining a club and then setting about achieving my distinctions. I had just registered to be a judge when Covid hit. Clubs were stuck for

speakers and finances were tight for everyone. Someone asked if I had a lecture as I'd just done my first ever judging booking via zoom, I didn't but quickly created one as a favour to help them and their club out. Word went round and the bookings came in for both lecturing and judging and that first year I was swamped.

Lockdown was actually great fun for me, I was on zoom so much that the months flew buy but talking to people in these meeting I quickly realised that mental health was declining, especially for older members and for many the weekly club meetings was their only social contact. Again photography was so many people's coping strategy. I decided that I wanted to help others find out about this great tool for self-help, so Re-Imagine Yourself was created.

The aim is to promote photography as a mindfulness tool that you can use whether at home or out





in nature, it doesn't matter if you use a phone or a standard camera the end result is still the same...you are taking your mind off whatever may be annoying you and bringing yourself into the present moment.

The Re-Imagine Yourself page

is not offering any kind of professional or semi-professional support or therapy. It is a group to enjoy photography with people that may be facing similar issues to you, who can understand and be caring.

Since retiring from full time professional photography, where I had to produce images of a certain type, specified quality and a specified number within a set time, it has been wonderful to take as long as I like making a picture that meets my expectations and gives me pleasure.

My Associate panel with the RPS was comprised entirely of multiple exposure images, not one of which would be likely to stand alone.

Perhaps these are the same!

The **e-news** "Dare to be Different" project which will be published in an "**extra**" in the Summer aims to help broaden the spectrum of what is considered to be acceptable Club photography but please don't forget that the PAGB MASTERS OF PRINT is already fully appreciative of such work. 


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

Friday 3 MAY to Monday 27 May 2024 THE WORLD PRESS PHOTO EXHIBITION RETURNS TO LONDON

Borough Yards, Dirty Lane, London, SE1 9AD.



The World Press Photo Contest, returning to London after a seven-year hiatus, claims to be the world's most prestigious photo competition, and will showcase the best and most important photojournalism and documentary photography from around the world.

The World Press Photo Foundation was founded in 1955, and since then its annual photo contest has showcased the best photojournalism and documentary photography of the previous year, to millions across the globe. Each year, the exhibition travels to over 60 cities, in more than 40 countries worldwide.

The London Exhibition Director, Woody Anderson, commented "In the realm of visual storytelling, World Press Photo stands at the forefront of its art. The unparalleled virtuosity, and often perilous pursuit of capturing the photos, position this exhibition at the vanguard of global photojournalism, sparking emotion, whilst vividly illuminating the most paramount news stories of our time."

Borough Yards is a cultural destination at the epicentre of London Bridge's creative scene. Situated underneath beautifully restored Victorian railway arches and surrounded by cultural landmarks such as Tate Modern. The destination is perfectly positioned to host this important photography exhibition.

The 67th World Press Photo Contest 2024 received 61,062 entries, by 3,581 photographers, from 130 countries, with 31 professionals from around the world spending six weeks reviewing this year's submissions.
